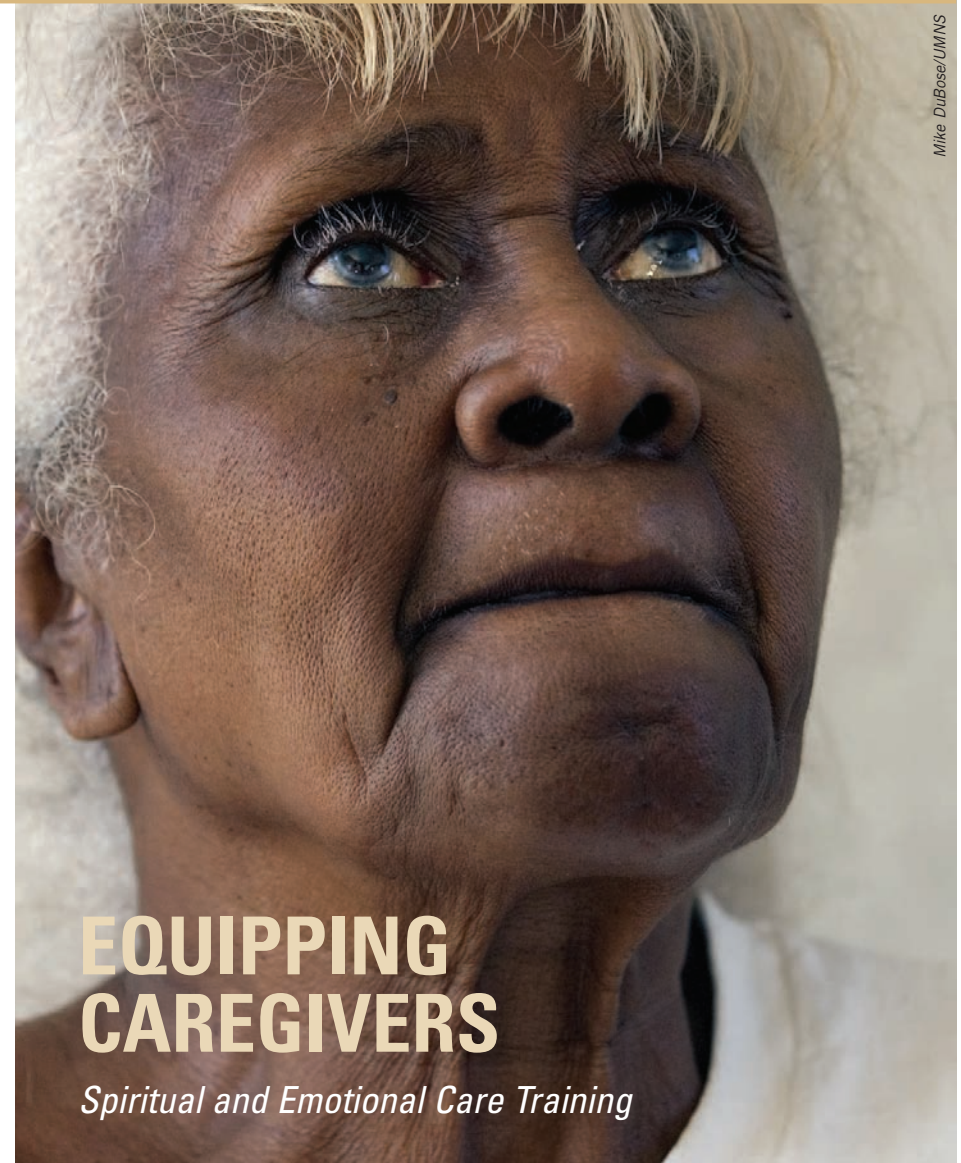

A Church Prepared

When disaster strikes, the local church usually provides the first response. This basic understanding that disaster response is local helps form a foundation for UMCOR’s national training and response. UMCOR equips United Methodists to prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters so that they can be the hands and feet of Christ in a hurting world.

Disasters Often Leave Survivors in Spiritual Crisis

Survivors may experience profound uncertainty, an inability to cope, a crisis of faith, or a loss of hope. For many, emotional and spiritual healing are as necessary as physical rebuilding.

The Church Responds

After a disaster, the church reaches out to people within the community to extend a listening ear, a word of comfort, and a caring presence. Trained spiritual and emotional caregivers are better equipped to offer much-needed support and encouragement to survivors.

UMCOR Offers Training

UMCOR may be called upon to assist with training, leadership, and coordination within The United Methodist Church and in cooperation with other faith-based and secular responders. Experienced, skilled, and compassionate UMCOR trainers highlight spiritual care gifts found among members within local churches. UMCOR’s training is consistent with guidelines* for faith-based organizations providing spiritual care following disasters.

Care Ministry Team Training

Care Teams are trained faith-based groups that work with their annual conference disaster committee to help survivors connect with emotional, spiritual, and basic life resources.

- *Basic Care Team Training (7 hours)*
Provides response training on spiritual and emotional care needs of affected individuals, communities, or congregations, and strategies for responders’ self-care.
- *Advanced Care Team Leader Training (4 hours)*
Provides necessary leadership tools and skills during and after deployment.
- *Advanced Congregational Care Team Training (3 hours)*
Provides practical ideas and a packaged program to use within congregations that have experienced disaster within their communities.

Other Spiritual and Emotional Care Training

- *“Calming After the Storm” Workshop (4 hours) & “The Ministry of Caring” Workshop (6 hours)*
Help participants recognize signs of stress and burnout when facing the unique emotional and spiritual challenges that accompany disaster.
- *Children’s Workshop*
Offers training for volunteers who wish to serve children affected by disaster (in partnership with the Church of the Brethren).
